

















## CANBERRA APPLE CALENDAR

**ORIGINALLY COMPILED BY JONATHAN BANKS AT PIALLIGO APPLES, ACT**

<b>ACID RED</b>	March	Sharp, good cooker for strudel
 <b>BLenheim ORANGE</b>	Early March	Famous heritage apple – orange flush with red striping and a sweet nutty flavour. One of the best dual purpose apples
<b>BLUNDELL'S APPLES (17 c.v.)</b>	From mid Jan to April	Collection from Blundell's Flat, Brindabellas
<b>BONNE HONNEUR</b>	May	Excellent reinette
<b>BONZA</b>	Late Feb	Similar to Jonathan, Australian variety
 <b>BELLE DE BOSKOOP</b>	mid Feb – early March	Cooker, well-known in Holland, Germany for making apfelmus
<b>BRAMLEY</b>	mid Jan	Tart acid – a great cooker, falls to lemony fluff
 <b>CAVILLE BLANC D'HIVER</b>	April	Heritage, ugly French apple from the 17 <sup>th</sup> Century. A delicious pie apple, said to contain more Vitamin C than an orange
 <b>CHRISTMAS APPLE (DEVONSHIRE QUARRENDEN)</b>	Early Jan	Ancient apple, formerly grown round Sydney for Christmas
 <b>CLEOPATRA</b>	Late Feb	Early green apple, formerly exported
 <b>COX'S ORANGE PIPPIN (FLEMING'S)</b>	Mid Feb	Well loved aromatic English apple with a spicy nutty flavour. Crisp and aromatic, with a perfect balance of sweetness and acidity
<b>COX'S ORANGE PIPPIN (RATTLING)</b>	Late Feb	A Cox clone with trademark rattling of pips when ripe
<b>COX'S ORANGE PIPPIN (RED)</b>	Mid Feb	A red sport of Cox
 <b>DEMOCRAT</b>	Late April	Thick skinned late Tasmanian apple
 <b>DISCOVERY</b>	Late Jan	Early aromatic apple
 <b>EGREMONT RUSSET</b>	Late Feb	Classic russet apple
<b>ENGLISH RUSSET</b>	Mid Feb	Greenish, sharp flavoured
<b>FIREMAN</b>	March	From Captains Flat, late showy eating apple
<b>FIVE CROWN</b>	Late March	Ancient apple, formerly widely grown in Australia. Crisp, brisk flavour
 <b>GALA</b>	Early Feb	Early pretty and well-flavoured eater – crisp, aromatic and sweet
<b>GALA (RED SPORT)</b>	Mid Feb	Bud sport of Gala
<b>GEEVESTON FANNY</b>	Late Feb	Very pleasant Tasmanian eating apple
 <b>GOLDEN DELICIOUS</b>	Late Feb - March	Aromatic golden apple, keeps shape when cooked

 <b>GRANNY SMITH</b>	March - May	Famous Australian apple, yellow when fully ripe
<b>GRAVENSTEIN</b>	Late Jan	Old German dual purpose apple
<b>JERSEYMAC</b>	Mid Jan	Modern very early apple, similar to Macintosh
 <b>JONATHAN</b>	Mid Feb - April	Classic eating apple, now little grown in Australia
<b>KIDD'S ORANGE</b>	Late Feb	Parent of Gala. Fine aromatic eating apple
<b>KING COLE</b>	April	Bright red Australian apple
<b>KING DAVID</b>	?	Cooker
 <b>KING OF THE PIPPINS (REINE DES REINETTES)</b>	Late Feb	Classic reinette
<b>LADY WILLIAMS</b>	Late May	Very late season Australian apple. Good storer. Parent of Pink Lady
<b>LATVIAN APPLE AKA WINTER TRANSPARENT</b>	Christmas	Very early white apple. Does not keep.
 <b>LORD LAMBOURNE</b>	Mid Feb	Aromatic and delicate
<b>LORD NELSON</b>	?	Early cooker
<b>LUXEMBOURG REINETTE</b>	?March	? Collected in Cordeaux orchard, near Wollongong
<b>MACINTOSH</b>	Mid Feb	Outstanding American/Canadian apple
<b>MRS POOH</b>	March	Collected Murrumbateman. Looks like old English apple
<b>MUTSU</b>	April	Superb Japanese apple
<b>NEWTON'S APPLE (FLOWER OF KENT)</b>	Early Feb	The one that fell on Newton's head – a good cooker, large lumpy fruit, subacid flush
<b>PINK LADY</b>	Late April	Late season Australian cultivar
<b>PIPPIN</b>	April	Late season eater. Real name not known
<b>PRINCE EDWARD</b>	March	Aromatic
<b>PRINZENAPFEL</b>	Early Feb	Early season, similar to Cox
<b>QUEEN OF THE SNOW</b>	Late April	Deep purple with white flesh.
 <b>RED DELICIOUS</b>	Mid Feb - April	Several variants available
<b>RED GRANNY</b>	April	A red sport of Granny Smith
<b>ROME BEAUTY</b>	April	Fine, large late season apple, very sweet
<b>SCARLET PEARMAIN</b>	May	Very well-flavoured
<b>SNOW (POMME DE NEIGE)</b>	Late Feb	Early white-fleshed apple, much loved by children. Makes good cider.

<b>STATESMAN 3</b>	April	Late season red apple
<b>STEWART SEEDLING</b>	March	Australian cooker
<b>STURMER PIPPIN</b>	April	Aromatic greenish apple
<b>TIGER</b>	Mid Feb	Striped, with a bite. Probably Gravenstein seedling
<b>TWENTY OUNCE</b>	Early Feb	Spectacular American cooker, very large with coarse flesh
 <b>TYDEMAN'S EARLY</b>	Mid Jan	Dark red, early apple
<b>VISTA BELLA</b>	Early Jan	Very early, almost purple
<b>WORCESTER PEARMAIN</b>	Early Feb	Aromatic and early
<b>YARLINGTON MILL</b>	Late Feb	Cider apple
<b>YATES</b>	May	Small, late season.
